#### 6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

It has also a vision to imbibe leadership quality among the students for the cause of nation building and strengthen the values, molding character, inculcate discipline and sprit of humanity among the students and to provide the skill and knowledge congruent to job in the society

#### 6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

The college adopt management information system in decision making process and control of the various activities of the college like admission, examination, accounts and administrative work etc.

#### 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

##### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

From time to time departmental meetings are held by the HODs with the faculties to discuss on the different aspects of curriculum so that up to date development can be ensured

##### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Apart from traditional method of teaching new technology such as LCD Projector, Laptop, Tab etc is also followed to impart lectures. Smart classes have been started in few wings of the college so as to impart education based on latest technology.

##### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The college prepares examination and evaluation system. The semester wise examination system in all the courses of UG & PG has been adopted. There are two examinations in per semester that is one mid semester internal and one end semester are conducted by the examination department and accordingly semester wise result is prepared the project work and assignment are also given to the students as a part of the course curriculum in UG & PG level. So far as evaluation is concerned the proper coding is done by examination to maintain the sanctity of the evaluation. In order to prepare to result in time , he centralize evaluation is also conducted for the evaluation of answer books of the subject having more answer books for which most of the examiner are appointed out of the college.

##### 6.3.4 Research and Development

Teachers are inspired always to take minor and major research projects of UGC. Besides pre placements talks are regularly held for helping students in recruitment process. Career advancement workshops are held from time to time. Along with all these things, Teachers of the college are guiding Ph.D. programs of the research scholars of the Ranchi University, Ranchi.

### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The college have rich library in the boys section and girl section both in which more than 70,000 ( Seventy thousands) Books concerning to course curriculum of the various subject are available for the students apart from the course books the books concerning to other important aspects concerning to religions historical and geographical aspects encyclopaedia etc are also available. The bar coding of about 5000 books of vocational subject has been completed; books are also accessible in the system. The ICT system has been installed in college and operated to a centre server system to enable to smooth and fast functioning of the various activities connected to it, ICT system is also used for the display of the various programs to the students as per the directive and guideline of the MHRD from time to time . So far as infrastructure is concerns the college has sufficient number of class rooms Labourites for practical classes and computer lab equipped of sufficient number of system. It has one auditorium having a sitting capacity of more than 400 persons; two conferences room, separate evaluation centre and separate administrative building.

### 6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The college has proper system for the management of Human Resource engaged in the college. The teaching faculty are supervised and controlled by the principal of the college in coordination with the prof- In charges and Deans, heads and coordinators of the departments the office staff are also properly placed in different section which are supervised and controlled by the head of the institution through the section In charges like Bursar controller of examinations /deputy controller of examinations library In charge and sports, culture NCC, NSS In charges.

### 6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Since the college is an autonomous constituent unit of Ranchi University Ranchi therefore the recruitment of faculty and staff is done by the Ranchi University in the college. At present apart from regular teachers some contractual and guest faculty are working in the college as appointed / allowed by the university. Likewise the staff of 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4th grade is also working on permanent and contractual basis as appointed and allowed by the university from time to time.

### 6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

Students of job oriented courses are sent to different industries for industrial training every year. The educational tours are also organized for them.
